

The Newcastle Williamtown Air Show 2023: Robbie Robinson

18 - 19 November

'What a blast' – were the words uttered by my son when I showed him the video sequences that I filmed at Nobby's beach on Saturday 18th November. Under clear blue skies and warm temperatures, the vast crowds that had assembled on and behind Nobby's beach and at Fort Scratchley were treated to a spectacular display of airmanship by an extensive inventory of current and former RAAF aircraft.



A defined area just offshore from Nobby's beach, became the stage over which the participating aircraft conducted an impressive array of breathtaking aerial manoeuvres. With aircraft entering the designated controlled area from the South, we were treated to an extraordinary display of aircraft capabilities at close quarters. A live commentary kept us well informed of the various aircraft types, their respective roles and capabilities.

The scene was set with a flyby by a number of historical wartime aircraft from 100 Sqn RAAF including the Wirraway, Winjeel, Hudson, Mustang, a Canberra and the ubiquitous Spitfire. The sight and sound of this aircraft, always so evocative of the young fighter pilots of World War II, was a reminder that modern sophisticated fighter aircraft, are flown by a new generation of highly capable and dedicated young men and women. A series of fast and breathtaking manoeuvres by an F-35, flying at over 1300kph and firing anti-missile flares, dramatically demonstrated the awesome capabilities of this amazing aircraft.

A spectacular air display by the Roulettes as well as the appearance of a number of the larger RAAF aircraft demonstrated the wide range of capabilities now available within the RAAF. They included the E-7A Wedgetail, for airborne command and control as well as a P8A Poseidon and P3C for Maritime Patrol and surveillance. These larger aircraft all conducted low passes and turning manoeuvres in front of the crowds which was impressive. All in all this was a spectacular display, well planned and conducted under perfect weather conditions in front of a huge and very appreciative crowd.

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
