WHAT'S IN A NAME? (Contributions from members welcome)

My name is **LINDSAY MAXWELL THREADGATE**, I was born in 1944. I know where Lindsay came from, my father's cousin, Maxwell from my mother's brother. But where did Threadgate come from?

Of course, it came from my father and in turn his father etc. My grandmother told me that two Threadgate brothers came out from England but only one had any family. In those days I was not very interested.

About 1980 it was becoming popular to trace your ancestry, scrolling through microfiche and reels in the Local History section of a Library. One had to become a Reader, once so, hours could be whiled away in front of a Reader at the Library. Birth records, death records and marriage records were all there, that is "local" records.

I was searching for my Great Great Grandparents marriage and found an almost illegible microfiche with Thomas Trudgate, widower, married Rebecca Grills, spinster, with the permission of the Governor. "You have "STRUCK GOLD" a fellow reader declared, you have a CONVICT.

Great but the name was not Threadgate... All other clues fitted, I accepted "Trudgate" had become "Threadgate". Searching the records of the Superintendent of Convict records in Sydney, I found the "Governor's permission", the ship, "Recovery (3) 1836", Native Place, "Norfolk", the date of the trial etc. And the Sentence "DEATH". He obviously was granted clemency and survived the transportation.

By this time my contacts with like interest had expanded and information sharing was interesting and exciting. A Second Cousin, Jim, had paid for some research in England. This had produced a newspaper article from 1835. An extract of that article reads...


**"The Norwich Mercury** Saturday 4<sup>th</sup> April 1835 *… "His Lordship asked Mr. Johnson if he knew anything of these men? Mr. Johnson said… the person called Trudgate, but whose real name was Cushing, came from Cossey, a village about 4 miles from Norwich… His Lordship said he had directed the sentence of death to be recorded against them… and although an application would be made to His Majesty that their lives might be spared, that was all they could expect;…"* 

I had become quite convinced that Threadgate was a variation, through illiteracy or deliberately of Trudgate with variations along the way of Thrudgate, Thredgate and the origin of the name was Norfolk, England. I was not prepared for my true family name to be Cushing. A whole new search was to ensue.

To be sure John Cushing married Sarah Trudgill at Cossey, Norfolk in 1805. Sarah was born in the village of Tibenham, about 20 miles from Norwich. The records show Trudgill and Trudgate as well

as other phonic variations on the gravestones in Tibenham as well as Cushing.

Where did my name "Threadgate" originate? Answer: Wee Waa, NSW in 1849 when my Great Grandfather was baptised. This was shortly before my Great Great Grandfather received his Conditional Pardon on 9 February 1850 and his name was Thomas Trudgate. As for Cushing: From all my research I have concluded that Thomas Trudgate was most likely really Thomas Cushing and he used an alias which was a variation of his mother's maiden name originating in the village of Tibenham, Norfolk, UK in the mid-18<sup>th</sup> century. Lindsay Threadgate - I am lucky!



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
